

CURRICULUM OFFER

Subject	PSHCE (Personal, Social, Health and Citizenship Education) and Careers
Intent	The aim is to equip students with the skills, knowledge and understanding to prepare them for real life situations concerning their personal / social lives and health. The emphasis is on learning how to make safe choices for themselves and others. The curriculum is based around the three Core Themes that are outlined in the PSHE Association Programme of Study:
	Health and Wellbeing Relationships Living in the Wider World
	All statutory components are included in our Curriculum Overview, as well as most of the additional elements recommended by the PSHE Association.
	In Key Stage 3 topics include:
	 Diet, exercise and healthy lifestyles (including puberty and FGM) Mental health and emotional wellbeing The risks of alcohol, tobacco and other substances Diversity and discrimination (including radicalisation and extremism) Relationships and Sex education (including online relationships) Careers education – developing skills and aspirations, setting goals Financial education – managing your money Digital literacy Employability skills First Aid Personal safety – weapons awareness, road safety, gangs, crime, online safety Law, rights and responsibilities – being a good citizen (including British Values) In Key Stage 4 we build on the learning in Key Stage 3 as follows:

Implementation

The curriculum is organised in a "spiral" structure so that students' prior knowledge is built upon in an age-appropriate way as they return to topics every year and extend their knowledge and understanding. We use information from the "SHEU" (Schools Health Education Unit) survey to inform the areas of priority for our students, as well as local health data.

Key Stage 3:

Individual topics are taught and assessed by PSHCE subject teachers. There is a Curriculum Overview which allocates certain topics per half term, but subject teachers may choose to deviate from this if they feel a student is in urgent need of specific curriculum content e.g., RSE, Drugs Education, CSE education.

Students complete a "confidence checker" at the beginning of each topic, which they revisit as they learn. This progress is recorded against the PSHE Association Programme of Study statements for Key Stage 3.

Key Stage 4:

In Year 10 and 11 we aim for students to achieve a Prince's Trust Award (2 units at Entry Level 3, Level 1, or Level 2). If students are completing separate units in Prince's Trust lessons, then we aim to combine these for students to achieve the Certificate (6 units). Students complete a "confidence checker" at the beginning of each topic, which they revisit as they learn. This progress is recorded against the PSHE Association Programme of Study statements for Key Stage 4. Other topics are assessed informally but do not result in a qualification.

SEND: PSHCE teachers are aware of students' needs, including SEND and EHCPs, and adapt their planning, teaching and resources accordingly. Access Arrangements are adhered to when completing coursework in KS4.

Remote offer: In the case of a need for a "remote offer", lessons will be conducted via Microsoft Teams and materials emailed to students.

Impact

In Key Stage 3, the emphasis is on equipping students with the knowledge, skills and understanding to make safe choices in order to "live life well".

In Key Stage 4, the aim is to ascertain and build on their prior knowledge from Key Stage 3, develop and extend it. There is a strong focus on preparing students for their next steps (post-16), and on developing employability skills, but students also have plenty of Health and Wellbeing input, as well as age-appropriate Relationships and Sex Education.

Safeguarding	Safeguarding runs through every aspect of PSHCE education. Subject staff are aware
	that the nature of our curriculum content can be conducive to students making
	disclosures or sharing concerns, and so are always conscious of this, as well as ensuring
	that we bear in mind that some topics can be sensitive to certain students.
	We are constantly aiming to equip students with the knowledge and skills that will
	enable them to handle situations they may encounter in real life where they could be
	faced with unsafe choices, such as in the areas of online safety, radicalisation and
	extremism, sexual harm, consent, CSE and in peer-on-peer relationships.
	We ensure that as part of learning in PSHCE, students are aware of sources of support
	that they can access if they feel that they or others are at risk or in danger.
Reading/Literacy	We encourage reading as a regular feature of PSHCE lessons in both Key Stage 3 and 4.
	This may involve students reading a passage or article aloud or taking turns to read
	aloud with other members of the class, and / or the members of staff in the lesson. Staff
	may read aloud to model tone and pace to students. At times we use reading
	comprehension tasks which students either respond to verbally or in writing. Key words
	are displayed in classrooms to aid memory and spelling.
Digital Literacy	Digital Literacy is covered in all years in our Curriculum Overview.
(including e-safety)	Safer Internet Day is covered in February every year.
	Laptops and iPads are used in all year groups, particularly in KS4 for coursework.
Number and	Number and numeracy are referred to where it occurs as part of a topic, e.g. units of
